

This year we are highlighting the importance of SJFF's "Go Green!" drive, an important priority of AJC, with a special program on Closing Sunday, and our festival is





SJFF14, GO GREEN!

How Going Green is a Core Jewish Value Sustaining Community & Global Identity Through Film,

Promoting Energy Independence for the Planet



"Reduce, Reuse, Recycle," is a rousing contemporary slogan, but for Jews, the inspiration to save the planet is deeply rooted in the Torah.

History, Halacha and the Environment

The Jewish commitment to the earth predates modern environmentalism by several thousand years. According to Jewish tradition, the earth belongs to G-d but, in the Garden of Eden, G-d designated Adam and Eve as the earth's stewards through the principle of l'ovdah u'lshomrah, or "to work and protect" (Genesis 2:15).

The Torah also speaks of Bal Tashchit, the law of no destruction or waste. In biblical times this mitzvah (commandment) forbade demolishing an enemy's fruit-bearing trees although it was acceptable to eat their fruit. The Torah teaches that by allowing trees to live and flower, they create abundant food resources for the people, thereby enabling societies to thrive.

Modern interpretations of halacha (Jewish Law) are bountiful. For many Jewish people, Bal Tashchit has come to symbolize a Jewish environmental imperative. This first appears in Deuteronomy 20:19, which prohibits the destruction of fruit trees in wartime. But for many synagogues, greening is not just about fulfilling a spiritual mandate. Being cautious about waste is a conscious, ethical choice to practice conservation and act as stewards of the environment. Another way of understanding our obligation to care for the world and its creatures is the concept of Tikkun Olam, commonly translated as "to repair the world" (or, to heal the world).

Similarly, the Jewish calendar is marked by rituals and holidays that reflect

a contemporary view of Judaism's inherent environmental consciousness. Today, some consider Shabbat a "green day" of the week. We are taught for example, that it is our sacred obligation not to drive or activate electricity on this day (call it, "Shabbat

unplugged!"); Hanukkah celebrates the miracle of recycled oil (what some have called "latke technology"): Tu'Bishvat is the Jewish Arbor Day, celebrating trees, and Sukkot is an autumn harvest holiday, observed by dwelling or eating in a modest hut, or sukkah. These holy days exist not only for the Jewish people, but are modern examples of Jewish environmental awareness from which everyone can learn.

AJC: Modern Day, **Progressive Solutions**

Our planet is in a growing state of environmental emergency, from the depletion of the ozone layer to overflowing landfills. Environmentalism is a 24/7/365 commitment, and living green is no longer an option, but a necessity.

Overseas, Israel is striving for technologies that reduce oil dependence, increase global security and that promise the creation of green jobs and infrastructures beyond its borders. Here in the United States, American Jewish Committee (AJC) has combined its work to promote pluralistic democratic societies and its support for Israel as one country boldly pushing for energy independence from fossil fuels. This is an enterprise that is beneficial for the United States, good for Israel, and positive for our entire planet. Given their values of protection and preservation, it comes as no surprise that AJC strives to be in the forefront of the Jewish Green Movement, which includes being a leader in the electric car movement.

AJC National's main offices are in a LEED-EB (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design-Existing Building) certified building; supporting not only a bold recycling program, but green cleaning policies, and a lighting reduction plan. Proudly, AJC Seattle is also in a

green LEED-EB building downtown. The AJC pushes the envelope even further by advocating for a plug-in system of hybrid electric cars around the country through Project New Car.

SJFF Going Green

This year, to complement AJC Seattle's commitment to promoting energy independence, the Seattle Jewish Film Festival (AJC's premiere program) undertakes an exceptional "GO GREEN!" educational program. To educate and motivate the community, SJFF is demonstrating how "going green" is a core Jewish value in a number of different ways.

For the entirety of the festival, the Seattle Jewish Film Festival is putting forth the theme "Sustaining Community & Global Identity through Film, Promoting Energy **Independence for the Planet."** This "Green Theme" communicates to festival-goers, and the community at large, AJC/SJFF's commitment to the environment and the overall well-being of the planet through films, programming and practices.

SJFF is stepping up, reducing the festival's carbon footprint and partnering with green organizations and businesses, such as Alphagraphics, our FSC Certified (Forest Stewardship Council) print sponsor; Paul Allen and Vulcan Inc., generous donors of Cinerama, who are using sustainable building practices to develop over 60 acres of land in Seattle's South Lake Union neighborhood; and celebrity restaurateur Tom Douglas—host of SJFF's Opening Night Party—who has been at the vanguard of restaurant recycling practices and supplies hundreds of Metro bus passes as part of a King County employer program. Opening Night, SJFF sponsor Craig Vinton, owner of All Star Entertainment, will display his electric car collection in the parking lot outside Cinerama. And for every audience member who signs up and takes a test drive with Carter Subaru ("On the Road to Carbon Neutral"/"Planting a Forest...One Test Drive at a Time"), Mountains to Sound Greenway will plant a tree in our local Greenway while SJFF, with the help of The Jewish National Fund, will plant a second tree in Israel—what amounts to a double, local-global green mitzvah!

What's more, throughout the festival, audiences will be asked to take the "Jewish Climate Challenge," and enter into a "covenant" with the earth, pledging to make immediate and impactful lifestyle changes that have a positive and measurable effect upon our environment (see sidebar).

SJFF: Artistic Commitment to Eco-Paradigms

Film is an exciting and relevant way to bring socio-political issues to the masses. This year the Seattle Jewish Film Festival presents several topical films. We are proud to be showing *Fuel*, a thought-provoking documentary about America's addiction to oil, and short selections from the film Renewal, an interfaith-inquiry documentary about the green faith environmental movement. Not only will SJFF show environmentally impactful films, but these screenings will also be free and open to the public on Closing Day.

SJFF is also expanding and deepening its "Go Green" theme through a gallery show of work by artists informed by the Jewish experience who work in ecological paradigms. מיקונים I **Tikkunim**, a joint venture be<mark>tw</mark>een SJFF and Howard H<mark>ous</mark>e Contemporary Art (located on 2nd & James downtown), explores the convergence of Jewish roots and ecological art. Humanity, nature, ecology and sustainability are examined through the media and message of nine artists. From photographs examining Americans' relationship with nature to sculptures reminiscent of vessels of antiquity but composed of recycled plastic bottles, from images of remediation projects to a sukkah of wood salvaged from a home demolition, tikkun olam is addressed for its contemporary environmental and artful meanings. The artists presented in מיקונים | **Tikkunim** offer versions of repairing the world—meditations on the current state of affairs and possibilities for reparations. On view through May 2, Tamar Benzikry-Stern, the exhibit curator and a film festival committee member, will give a curator's talk for First Thursday on April 2nd. On Closing Sunday, May 3rd, upstairs in MOHAI's McCurdy Gallery at 5pm, SJFF 14, GO GREEN! culminates with "Green Faith/Faithfully Green," a panel discussion and screening of short films from the documentary Renewal. Speakers include nonprofit and religious leaders from The Jewish Climate Challenge™ (Rodef Tzedek and Carbon Salon™), Mountains to Sound Greenway, The Jewish National Fund, Earth Ministry/Washington Interfaith Power and Light, "Ecopreneurs" from American Technion, as well as guest artists. The free panel concludes with a Closing Day reception (\$5 suggested donation), followed by a free public screening of the film Fuel, directed by Josh Tickell, who is expected to attend.

מווות אאו דו תיקונים

The Seattle <mark>Jewish Film Festival and Howard House Contemporary Art Present a Gallery Show of Ecological Art by Artists with Jewish Roots </mark>

The 2009 Seattle Jewish Film Festival is extending and deepening its "Go Green" theme through a gallery show of work by artists with Jewish roots who create ecological art. With a focus on communities and inter-relationships, sustainability is examined through the media and message wielded by ten artists in Tikkunim, a joint venture with Howard House Contemporary Art.

Curated by Tamar Benzikry-Stern, תיקונים **Tikkunim** refers to *tikkun olam*, the ancient Hebrew expression that has become a catch-all for healing, mending, repairing the world and improving society through social activism. While Rabbinic *takkanah* legislation, of shared etymology, was often designed to remedy legal inequalities or unjust social situations, the artists in תיקונים **Tikkunim** address environmental justice, specifically the restoration of ecological balance.

Some artists offer meditations on the current state of affairs. Mierle Laderman Ukeles' work points to water in a cleft Israeli landscape of ancient Gerar, near present-day Gaza. It is symbolic of the site's biblical wells and promise of overcoming community division. Photographer Manya Fox examines Americans' relationship with nature—their desire to commune with it and the disconnect between an imagined nature and an authentic one. Ann T. Rosenthal explores the meaning of natural resources, presenting the tree's contrasting use in nature and by humans. Ruth Wallen explores the frog as an indicator of ecological collapse through a combination of photographs and illustrations, culled from museum storerooms, a frog-jumping contest, scientific illustrations, fables and contemporary advertisements. Beverly Naidus alters ads filled with pronouncements of consumer desire and progress from the post-World War II era with words of painful humor that reflect communal denial or individual despair over living as canaries in the coal mine.

Other artists in רקונים | Tikkunim offer possibilities for reparation by transforming refuse into works of art and calls to action. Ilene Sunshine transforms discarded Christmas trees into sculptural drawings — a process of reconstruction and renewal. Shari Mendelson collects plastic bottles from recycling bins, alchemically reconstructing them into archaeological sculptures akin to the ceramic, metal and glass vessels of antiquity you would see at the Israel Museum. Sharon Siskin combines Arabic children's books gathered at the San Francisco Dump with Hebrew books from her childhood, using various means of cohesion to bind two distinct parts of the Middle Eastern ecology together. Local architect George Ostrow employs sustainable design, re-using materials such as old growth fir salvaged from a home demolition to create the temporary ritual shelters known as sukkot.

Still others remediate, creating art objects or art plans that reverse or stop environmental damage. **Beverly Naidus'** plan for a permaculture garden with interactive altars on Vashon Island will herald a larger soil remediation project designed to remove soil contaminants. **Jackie Brookner's** living sculptures, known as Biosculptures, are formed of water-cleaning and filtering plants and combine the function of wetland, river and stream revitalization with the conceptual and aesthetic capacities of sculpture.

Similar to the Jewish books known as *tikkunim* that share source material but offer versions of functionality, each artist examines inter-relationships as source material and offers a version of environmental repair. The artists presented in מיקונים | **Tikkunim** share Jewish roots, many citing *tikkun olam* as a basic source and link to a universal art practice that addresses community and ecology: belonging to a larger whole.

Tamar Benzikry-Stern, the curator of היקונים | **Tikkunim**, holds an MA in Jewish Art and Visual Culture and is also an SJFF film selection committee member.

The Road to Sustainability

Ten years ago, scientists got together to come up with a number that could quantify the world's annual energy usage so it could be measured and, possibly, reduced as usage grew with the population and technology. That number is 12.8 terawatts— or, to put it in some semblance of scale, roughly the equivalent of 13,000 nuclear energy facilities working at capacity— with growth at the time projected to reach 25 terawatts by 2050.

At the same time, Dave Chameides was driving a beat-up Toyota 4Runner SUV with oversized tires and lousy gas mileage. Gas cost around \$1.50 a gallon, and he didn't give much thought to energy usage or environmental sustainability aside from putting out his recycling on the curb.

When, a few years later, his wife got pregnant with his first child, "I just sort of woke up and I said, 'Wait a minute, there's someone after me,'" Chameides said. So he sold the SUV and the sports car, bought an early-generation hybrid, and began to figure out ways to reduce his footprint on the planet.

According to Chameides, "present calculations say we're way above the curve" on the 50-year, 25 terawatt estimate.

Today, Chameides has traded in his Prius for a car that runs on vegetable oil that would otherwise be dumped by fast food joints. He also recently completed a year-long project, called "365 Days of Trash," in which he saved all of his non-recyclable, non-compostable waste in his basement so he knew, to the last gum wrapper, his contribution to the world's landfills.

"The reason really is, besides having people make fun of me and whatnot, is to get a better connection with what my impact is," Chameides told Temple Beth Am last summer, at a talk he gave called "Chasing Sustainability." The talk was sponsored by the Kavana Cooperative, Rodef Tzedek, a local justice organization that focuses on environmental responsibility as one of its central tenets, and Carbon Salon, a project by Kavana member Yoram Bernet that measures carbon output and allows users to cut down on their carbon footprints.

Environmentalism, Chameides said, needs to be a religious imperative.

"Whoever your God is that created the planet, it's a sin to destroy the planet," he said.

What environmentalism should not be, he said, is politicized.

"I don't mention Al Gore, I don't mention politics, I don't talk about global warming, because, number one, global warming is much too big...it's been too politicized," Chameides said in an interview after his talk. "Slavery, the right to food, global warming...they're too important to be politicized."

Chameides' also stresses the importance of refraining from being judgmental when attempting to reduce their waste.

"Just ask people to do what they can and be honest about what they're doing and hope for the best," he said.

On one hand, Chameides is pessimistic about our future. He has graphs and videos and experts who show that we're close to reaching peak oil, the point at which we've sucked up half of what's in the ground — if we haven't already.

"This is the point where it becomes exponentially harder to get the oil," Chameides said.

He showed his audience that energy usage in the U.S. is growing more slowly, but is being eclipsed by the burgeoning economies and populations in China and India.

Whatever anyone's belief may be in reducing fossil fuel usage — environmental reasons, national security, weaning from reliance on the Middle East — we need to

start relying much more heavily on alternative sources, Chameides said.

It's a position shared by such people as Jeroen van der Veer, Chief Executive of Royal Dutch Shell plc.

"After 2015, easily accessible supplies of oil and gas probably will no longer keep up with demand," van der Veer said in a speech in January of last year.

Chameides is worried — very worried — that at the current rates of consumption, the standard of living he grew up with and his children may grow up with, will be far different from the lives his grandchildren will have.

"It's unsustainable," he said. "It can't happen. It won't happen."

But on the other hand, Chameides is optimistic: That through his own conservation, as well as teaching others about ways to reduce their impact without dramatically changing their habits, he can, in some way, reduce the shock of the end of the oil era. So he promotes alternative energy, waste reduction, and pragmatic solutions that don't cost a lot, but also don't encourage consumption.

One of those solutions: Carry a reusable water container to steer clear of bottled water. Bottled water, Chameides noted, costs the average person about \$900 a year — versus around \$8 to fill up his container. From a fiscal point of view, he said, it makes no sense. And, he added, there is no regulation on bottled water that crosses state lines. Municipal tap water quality, on the other hand, is heavily regulated.

Chameides also spoke about cars, one of his passions within the sphere of sustainability. He showed slides of the "grease car" system he installed in his Volkswagen as well as the benefits of biodiesel fuel, though he did not get into some of the drawbacks of these fuels, such as the need for petroleum to create biofuels or the difficulty of using them in cold weather. He had harsh words for ethanol, a cornbased fuel that has been accused of being partially responsible for recent increases in global food prices.

"Food should be grown to be eaten," he said. "It should not be grown to get our butt from one place to another."

With all of the work he has seen by synagogues and Jewish organizations in favor of sustainability, Chameides mused that Jews could become the forefront of the environmental movement.

"If ever there have been a people that have seen hardships," he said, "we know firsthand how dark things can be. But we know firsthand how we can rise out of that."

Chameides, the product of an Orthodox education in his native Connecticut, still sees a schism between the Reform and Conservative movements, which have embraced the idea of conserving for the planet, and the Orthodox movement, which largely has not.

"I think this would be a great time for them to embrace and say we have our differences, but in terms of ruining the environment that we're leaving for our children, we can't have differences," he said. "It's too important. We need to move forward and say, 'Let's all get on the same bus and say we're leaders in this effort, and get synonymous with this."

Beyond Personal Virtue

In April of 2001, Vice President Dick Cheney was quoted in an interview asserting that "Conservation may be a sign of personal virtue, but it is not a sufficient basis for a sound, comprehensive energy policy." He was roundly excoriated by the environmental community for this view. Seven years later, in the midst of skyrocketing energy prices, increasing climate change, and global food shortages, most people in the U.S. continue to live as if the environmental crisis can be dealt with through acts of personal virtue confined to consumer choices.

On this issue most American Jews are no different from other Americans. We belong to the highest-consuming nation in the world, the least energy efficient, the largest producer of greenhouse gases; we are part of our society that consumes the most, and yet we act as if changing a light bulb, using our reusable bags from

Whole Foods, planting trees in Israel as carbon offsets, and buying more organic food will solve the climate change crisis.

While many Jewish organizations have policy statements that call for significant environmental action, those same organizations up until now have failed to implement these policies. Over the past 18 months, the interfaith environmental organization GreenFaith has been touring the film An Inconvenient Truth. Following the viewing and discussion, the group gives out pledge cards with five, increasingly difficult actions — from changing light bulbs to buying a lowmileage car or hybrid. Though this and other groups are helping people see how to do things to make a difference, it is not enough.

Jewish environmentalists are stuck

— for the most part — in an apologetic approach, which posits that religious traditions as such supply all the needed theological resources to address the environmental crisis. Although the first Jewish theological response to the crisis was written 40 years ago, yet the same biblical and rabbinic texts continue to be cited and discussed in our writing.

This lack of new theology reinforces the idea that environmental actions can remain a personal virtue. By emphasizing *tikkun olam*, Jewish environmentalism has not moved beyond a stewardship ethic that privileges human needs. And we have not seriously embraced the ethic of environmental justice that connects the degradation of the environment to racism and economic inequities. Jewish theolo-

gians and ethicists for the most part have not been part of the significant critique of modern capitalism and globalization that has been coming from process theology, liberation theology, and ecofeminism.

It is time for Jewish environmentalism to move beyond an apologetic theology and an ethic of personal virtue to become more engaged with the many creative ideas that have been emanating from religious and environmental movements. New Creation theology, which emphasizes the interconnection of all people and all life, must become the foundation of a far bolder Jewish ethical response. As the environmental crisis grows more serious, we must help people understand how our lifestyles affect the lives of millions of other people in this country and around the world, how our lives contribute to the extinction of thousands of species every year, and how we are literally con-

suming the earth.

British writer George Monbiot claims we must set a goal of 90 percent reduction; this will not be achieved by only changing light bulbs. Monbiot puts forward a moral choice: continue to live the way we do and have millions of people die in Ethiopia (from drought) and Bangladesh (from rising seas) or radically change.

Do we continue to resist or deny that choice because we project, as Monbiot points out, "the future as repeated instances of the present"? We all believe that we will not be affected; we will find a way to survive or that somehow something will save us. If we all change a light bulb, the Messiah will come. The midrash that Jewish environmentalists love to quote has God saying, "See to it that you do not spoil and destroy My world; for if

you do, there will be no one else to repair it." It is time to heed that call.





The Trio was arrested and held in custody for weeks. The sisters had a complex relationship to their Judaism, which was at times downplayed when convenient. This lovely documentary features rare, found footage of their unique performances from the Fascist period.

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
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A Diversity Education Workshop for Youth Presented by the American Jewish Committee's Seattle Jewish Film Festival
