

From its beginning ten years ago in a 100-seat theatre, SJFF has grown to be one of the top Jewish film festivals in the country and the largest Jewish event in the Northwest. The medium of film is an ideal vehicle to further the goals of the AJC; to nurture pluralism, build bridges among racial, religious and ethnic groups and enrich the quality of American Jewish life. We hope you will learn from, be stimulated by and thoroughly enjoy the films representing more than ten countries.

This year we will again open at the Cinerama. Then we move to the Broadway Performance Hall. Here will be housed the Deborah Rosen and Nancy Vineberg Tenth Anniversary Center to honor the achievements of SJFF Founding Chair and Festival Director. Take time to explore the history, memorabilia, and films from the past ten years. Our grand finale will be at the magnificent Fifth Avenue Theatre. Its elegance will be a perfect setting in which to end our exciting week.

To further celebrate this monumental year and the achievements it represents, we have added programs and expanded our outreach. Our free-for-seniors matinees will take place at the Stroum Jewish Community Center on Mercer Island and the Summit at First Hill and the Kline Galland Home in Seattle. Lunch will be served at the SJCC and groups will be bussed in from several assisted living facilities.

FILMTalks! is another program that was conceived and developed eight years ago and today is being modeled across the country. On March 14th and again in April more than 600 students will take part in this day-long diversity training workshop using film to promote dialogue. Here students from many ethnic and socio-economic groups sit together discussing diversity and tolerance in a safe environment where they feel comfortable expressing their opinions.

Although our Seattle chapter's obvious focus this week is the festival, we have other outstanding programs and speakers throughout the year. The AJC is a great presence nationally and internationally. It works to effect change in various human rights causes and it provides a strong voice in support of Israel.

We have dedicated and named the center for SJFF Founding Chair, Deborah Rosen, and Former Director, Nancy Vineberg, in recognition of their extraordinary leadership and vision in the creation of The Seattle Jewish Film Festival. SJFF, since its origins as a small pilot AJC membership program in 1995, has become the Seattle AJC's signature program, and one of the largest and most highly regarded film festivals in the country.

Spend time in this warmly decorated room complete with Persian carpets, leather sofas and chairs, Persian sweets and tea served from a samovar, while perusing memorabilia, program guides and highlights, and viewing shorts and films from our past ten years! A timeline of past chairs, directors, and films, including many Academy Award winners in the Best Foreign Film and Best Documentary categories will be a "walk down memory lane" for film lovers.

The Center will also house memorabilia, medals and photographs from one of the original team members of the Hakoah Sports Club of Vienna, founded in 1909, and featured in this year's award-winning film *Watermarks*. These treasures are on loan to us from her family members, who live in the Northwest.





movies shape our perception of the Holocaust. Imaginary Witness weaves together fascinating clips from dozens of Hollywood films, many rare or forgotten. First-hand accounts and interviews with leading directors such as Steven Spielberg and Sydney Lumet, take us on a 60-year journey through Hollywood and television's noble and misguided efforts to dramatize the horrors of Nazi Germany and the resulting catastrophe. Despite the gravity of the subject, Anker has created an enormously entertaining and enlightening film that relives Hollywood's early attempts at addressing the threat of Fascism from Chaplin's self-financed classic The Great Dictator to B-list bombs like Confessions of a Nazi Spy.




he does not have the heart to tell his wife the truth. With the help of his actorfriends, a farce ensues. Maurice plays the role of his life to protect Perla and make her proud.


The Personals: Improvisations on Romance in the Golden Years

When Keiko Ibi, an NYU film student from Tokyo, won the Academy Award for Best Short Documentary and surprised everyone in 1999, the Seattle Jewish Film Festival featured her film in our 2000 festival lineup. We are proud to re-present *The* Personals featuring a Jewish senior citizens' theatre group on New York's Lower East Side performing newspaper-style "personal ads" that describe their best assets and ideal mates. The cast members candidly address both onstage and off - issues facing



their generation, such as loneliness, health, and their continuing search for love and companionship.

Northwest Premiere Israel 2004, Beta, 64 min. Arabic, English, Hebrew w/subtitles Directed by Dov Gil-Har

An Israeli police officer and a Palestinian journalist — once friends, now on bitterly

divided sides of national conflict — reunite for an emotional journey through Jerusalem and the landscape of the Intifada, as each attempts to convince the other of his own truth. Benny Hernes, a captain in the Israeli police force, first met journalist Adnan Joulani on a peace mission to Japan four years ago, and they formed a surprising and optimistic friendship. In the intervening time, however, a member of Adnan's family has been killed by settlers, and Adnan's frustration rises as he covers the conflict daily as a journalist. Benny has meanwhile become a settler and trains special Israeli forces to combat Palestinian militants. In Dov Gil-Har's moving and compassionate documentary, Benny and Adnan agree to meet again, spending four days traveling to locations that each has chosen to represent his own reality. From the Holocaust Memorial of Yad Vashem and the Temple Mount, to the Jenin refugee camp, Benny and Adnan struggle to find a way past the violence that separates them, and for a moment to see through the other's eyes.

Suzie Gold has been called My Big Fat Jewish Wedding for the Bridget Jones crowd. Set in an insular nouveau-riche north London community, this romantic comedy features a whole *mishpokhe* of guirky and colorful — albeit somewhat stereotypical — characters. At the center is Suzie, played with lovable charm by American actress Summer Phoenix, as a twenty-something Jewish princess who suffers an identity crisis after her sister becomes engaged. Under pressure to tie the knot with a "nice Jewish boy," Suzie begins to question the traditions that have comfortably defined her. Her doting but dysfunctional family desperately wants her to be happy, but only according to their exacting (double) standards. Will she marry their dream Jewish son-in-law or the unsanctioned "goy wonder" she's been seeing on the sly? Suzie must decide whether to follow the path laid out for her or forge uncharted territory.



Against all odds, Rabinowitz built several hugely successful clothing stores that became the bedrock of Haugesund's business community. Still, he remained a social

outsider to the town's business elite and his employees alike. Writing weekly newspaper columns, Rabinowitz became an admirably outspoken critic of Hitler's regime. Though some harbored him, oblivious to their own latent anti-Semitism to this day, the townspeople still claim that it was Rabinowitz's own greed that led to his capture. The town's broad complicity in his tragic fate offers a deeply unsettling portrait of entrenched anti-Semitism.

Watermarks is the story of the champion women swimmers of the legendary Jewish sports club, Hakoah Vienna. Hakoah ("strength" in Hebrew) was founded in 1909 in response to the notorious Aryan Paragraph, forbidding Austrian sports clubs from accepting Jewish athletes. Its founders were eager to popularize athleticism among a community renowned for great minds but considered alien to physical prowess. Hakoah rapidly grew into one of Europe's biggest athletic clubs achieving astonishing success in diverse sports arenas. In the 1930s, Hakoah's best-known triumphs came from its women swimmers, who dominated national competitions in Austria. After the political unification of Nazi Germany and Austria in 1938, the Nazis shut down the club but the swimmers managed to flee the country before the war broke out, thanks to an escape operation organized by Hakoah's functionaries. Sixty-five years later, director Yaron Zilberman meets the members of

the women's swim team in their homes around the world and arranges for a reunion of their beloved club in their old swimming pool in Vienna. Their journey evokes memories of youth, femininity and strengthens lifelong bonds. Told by the swimmers, now in their eighties, *Watermarks* is about a group of young girls with a passion for excellence. It is the saga of seven outstanding athletes who still swim daily as they age with grace. *The New York Times* calls *Watermarks*, "a moving documentary that approaches the Holocaust from a fresh, intimate perspective."





One of the most successful Israeli films of the last decade, Turn Left at the End of the World features an international cast of French, Indian and Israeli actors. The year is 1969. Into a small town in the Israeli desert, inhabited mostly by Moroccan immigrants, come a few Indian families — who arrive in Israel seeking a better life.
