Just five years ago the American Jewish Committee of Greater Seattle launched the first Seattle Jewish Film Festival. 

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


LEADING STUDENTS IN THE FIGHT AGAINST BIGOTRY

Announcing FILMTalks!, a daylong diversity program for high school students. At its core, FILMTalks! uses film to engage students in discussions about prejudice and intolerance. By using film to raise these issues, FILMTalks! introduces youth to the powerful role film can play in breaking social barriers and creating bridges of cultural understanding. Using the American Jewish Committee's acclaimed education program 'Hands Across the Campus' as its foundation, students begin developing the skills necessary to enhance inter-group communication and understanding, as well as foster respect and diversity in their schools.

Last year FILMTalks! brought together 250 students from fourteen schools. According to the Seattle Times, FILMTalks! "Opens people's eyes to what is out there. You can't just turn to your own people, you have to turn to others." One student participant added, "We need more things like this."

This year FILMTalks! will bring together over 300 students from public and private schools in King and Pierce County to share experiences and exchange ideas. Students will watch a thought-provoking film, engage in town-hall forums, and participate in small group discussions that create a safe atmosphere for students to explore their values and find their own voice about these issues.

Yana's Friends is an irresistible romantic comedy about Russian immigrants who land in the brave new world of Tel-Aviv during the Gulf War. This absurd situation draws young and beautiful Yana toward Eli, her playboy Israeli roommate. A wedding videographer and professional voyeur, Eli captures Yana's most private moments when her husband secretly returns to Moscow and she is left to fend for herself. Outside, missiles fly and Saddam Hussein threatens chemical warfare. But in the apartment's only safe, hermetically sealed bedroom, sparks of a different nature fly. When a crack in the ceiling reveals their

There are no easy answers or quick-fixes to the poison of hatred and bigotry that plagues our society. Through scholarly conferences, educational initiatives, exchange programs, in-depth publications, and newspaper advertisements we decry hatred and violence and work to replace them with tolerance and cooperation.

AJC advocates for the enactment of effective hate crimes and gun control legislation; the empowerment of law enforcement, within constitutional limits, to monitor and infiltrate hate groups; and full-scale Congressional hearings into the dangerous subculture of hate. We work with local organizations to combat hate groups and urge society's leaders to speak out forcefully and unequivocally to condemn prejudice and racism.



As the son of a Jewish father and a Christian mother, Gadi is like Menelik, the legendary son of King Solomon and the Queen of Sheba. Feeling misunderstood by Israelis, he misses his mother in Ethiopia and awaits a reply to his many letters which never come. The film follows Gadi's journey back to his birthplace in search of his past. A much-anticipated, emotional homecoming in Ethiopia reveals more about Gadi's present: his adopted Israeli identity.


WHO'S THE CABOOSE?

This hilarious mock-documentary lampoons the Hollywood snake pit, complete with cutthroat thespians and backstabbing agents. Susan, a New York comic, embarks for L.A.'s "pilot season," pinning her hopes on a TV sitcom. Her milquetoast boyfriend Max follows her out hoping to shack up with the ambitious dark beauty. Competing with bevies of blonde actress-wannabes, Susan finally lands a big role, but is unable to change her look. A gut-busting, frustrated jab at the "Jewish paradox" in Hollywood. When is Jewish humor considered "too Jewish"? Andy Dick's portrayal of Susan's Hollywood agent drips with irony. This film will especially amuse diehard Seattlites.



Sold out across the country, Aviva Kempner's award-winning documentary about the remarkable career of 1930s and '40s baseball great Hank Greenberg is a Yiddishe homerun. The New York Times calls her "valentine" to the Detroit Tiger's first baseman, "poignant, humorous" and fascinating." As Hitler invaded Europe, this dashing young slugger challenged Lou Gehrig's RBI and Babe Ruth's homerun records. Some pitchers insisted on walking him, but the 6-foot-4-inch ballplayer gracefully withstood anti-Semitic jibes and defied racial stereotyping on and off the playing field. He even sat out on Yom Kippur during the World Series until a rabbi okayed him for play. The papers chimed: "Talmud Clears Greenberg" and "L'Shana Tovah" in Hebrew.



THE FUTURE OF MEMORY **Q**VITAL HISTORY, VIBRANT VISIONS

"Those who do not remember the past are condemned to repeat it." As we enter a new century, the world continues to come to terms with last century's greatest tragedy, the Holocaust. The American Jewish Committee is deeply troubled by Holocaust denial and the refusal of governments and businesses to accept moral and financial responsibility for their role during World War II. AJC participates in Holocaust conferences around the world, disseminates in-depth publications on Holocaust denial and deniers, and conducts important research on knowledge and remembrance of the Holocaust in various countries.

Through efforts in America and our Berlin Office, AJC was instrumental in the German government's decision to set up a fund to compensate Holocaust survivors living in Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. Most recently, AJC's widely publicized list of hundreds of German companies that used slave or forced labor during the Nazi-era led to the substantial growth of a fund which will be used to compensate these aged laborers.

With the intimacy of a family album and the artistry of a museum piece, Zyklon Portrait is a riveting collage of underwater photography, family interviews, home videos and instructional films straight from the science archives. Underneath the story of how the Nazis transformed Zyklon B gas from a bug pesticide to a genocidal weapon lies the portrait of three generations of women. Mother and filmmaker daughter try to reconcile an awful past with a hopeful future by shaping and giving form to unspeakable memories.

Despite the ruthless Vichy laws and the French government's collaboration with the Nazis, a tiny village in unoccupied France saved the lives of 400 Jewish refugee children. Filmmaker Lisa Gossels returned to Chabannes with her father and uncle - two child survivors - to tell the untold lives and livelihoods to protect them simply because they felt it was the right thing to do. Interviewed are the extraordinary teachers who taught, loved and sheltered these children in a converted chateau. Their remarkable efforts make this a moving and lyrical film about courage, resilience and resistance.

Before WWII, Vilna or Vilnius was the cultural capital of Europe and a hub of Jewish life. Shot in the ghettos of Vilna and Riga, Latvia, the film is a dreamscape of cobblestone, departing trolley cars and clouded memories. Filmmaker Harvey Wang admits that he didn't even attempt to document the unbearable destruction of this Hongkew - known as "Little city and it's inhabitants. THE SHVITZ

Here's the rub... shvitz is Yiddish for sweating, a.k.a. bathhouses for ritual healing, massages and steamy relaxation. This film shows us how the sweats came into existence, why most shut down and captures the fading subculture of the authentic Russian bathhouses – the last remaining and still thriving on the Lower East Side. Like the cigar bars of the '90s, the shvitz is a place where men congregate habitually. We meet a group of hefty, mature devotees kibbitzing in the nude. Ladies nights and co-ed hours, however, have kept the baths afloat. Berman's film is part nostalgia, part stand-up comedy with a little nudity thrown in for fun. The Greek chorus of seniors on the Coney Island boardwalk makes this movie a priceless piece of Jewish history.



A vivid and refreshing look at what the media often glosses over. 



These business "moguls" lorded over artists and studios, but the hearings - driven by anti-Semitism - reduced them

in the public eye. This is an unforgettable behind-the-scenes movie about the movie industry as it has never been seen before.

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



We follow a young cell-phone wielding doctor nicknamed "The Mohel to the Stars," an Orthodox rabbi with 11,000 circumcisions under his belt, and a nurse-midwife as they perform the ceremony for a host of Jewish communities – secular and religious, Sephardic and Ashkenaz. In their own voices and shot in verité style, we gain an understanding of what it



means to perform a 3,700 yearold ceremony in America's most modern city. Balancing both humor and emotion – which the bris ceremony naturally evokes -L.A. Mohel is a crowd pleaser.
