Dear Friends,

"What does it mean to be Jewish?" This is the central question that we explore while previewing films for SJFF. The richness and diversity of the Jewish experience is fascinating and vast. In watching the tapes, our quest took us on an inner journey – renewing our individual dialogue about our own Jewish identity. Thought provoking and artistic, these films also took us on an emotional ride from sadness and frustration to pride and joy with laughter sprinkled throughout. It occurred to us that this film festival may be the best forum to explore this question, and the thought of watching our line-up with you, in this state-of-the-art theater, is exciting.

This year we watched over 200 films from the US, Israel and many other countries. We strove to reflect the current state of filmmaking around the world and chose our films with quality as our highest criteria. As in years past, we discovered that this year's selection explores new topics and offers fresh insights into familiar subjects.

The "Future of Memory" continues to fascinate us as film takes on an increasingly important role in the preservation of personal histories and oral traditions. The decreasing costs of film production, the passing of a generation, and the contrast between European Jewish history and what is happening in Israel today have all led to an explosion of films focused on the evolution of memory. Our film selection is sure to provoke lively discussion. So, on our closing day, we will provide an entire panel of experts to address this issue.

We also found that Israeli film continues to open windows of insight into the country's evolution and the extreme diversity of the cultures that strive to survive together. While the current state of politics is not directly addressed in any one film, it is a thread woven into all of the films in our "Modern Israel: At Peace with Pluralism?". programming element.

Speaking of politics... Jews were among the creators and victims of many of the 20th-century's most influential social and political ideologies. This year we will look at the history of ideas through a Jewish lens with a third programming element, "Visions of Utopia: Political Dreams and Nightmares", exploring the impact of Jewish intellectualism.

Lastly, we will offer films that enable us to celebrate the triumph of life over adversity. To us, this is the strongest answer to the question. "What does it mean to be Jewish?" Each night of the festival illustrates the power of *chutzpah* and its continual ability to sustain and renew our culture. We hope that our selection will give you the opportunity to explore your own answers to this question.



"Tears of happiness gleamed in the eyes of Jewish audiences, thirsty for redemption," said film exhibitor Yaacov Davidson, when The Life of the Jews in Palestine was first shown in European ghettos and market towns in 1913. The film depicts Middle Eastern and European Jews tilling fields, building schools, and laboring side by side to build the nation that would become Israel. This newly rediscovered and restored film, shot by Russian documentarian and active Zionist Noah Sokolovsky, is a striking document of political and cinematic history, a call for the Jews of the Diaspora to make aliya and join their brethren living, working, and praying in the land of milk and honey


