### WELCOME!

It is said that levels of maturity are achieved in seven-year increments, and the Seattle Jewish Film Festival, presented by the American Jewish Committee (AJC), is right on schedule with its 7th season.

A certain degree of maturity has certainly been achieved simply through lessons learned from the first six years. In other ways, maturity has been thrust upon us as we manage the complexities of the times in which we live. The shiver that September 11th sent through the world was certainly horrible. For Jews, it contained something dreadfully familiar: the ever-present threat of persecution, violence, and extinction. If anything, this awareness increased our commitment to use the art of film to promote understanding, and the format of an arts festival to inspire discussion and reflection.

We faced a financial reality as well, producing an arts event in a recession when, typically, funding for arts and culture dwindles as basic needs such as food, clothing, and shelter have more urgency. In this area, the maturity of the SJFF proved a distinct plus as our institutional and individual funders stayed with us, knowing we would steward their support well.

There was never any doubt that the audience would be there for another SJFF. A recent demographic study sponsored by the Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle showed that 75% of all respondents go to or rent a Jewish movie regardless of any other affiliation or participation in the Jewish community. We viewed this as great news.

This year's SJFF has three themes: The Binds That Tie, Homeland Insecurity, and The Future of Memory. They are each informed by AJC responses to issues facing the Jewish community. We invite you to explore these with us this week, read about them in this guide, and use the films to expand your understanding of these issues. —see page 12

The SJFF is created with the explicit intention of engaging an audience with films that have a unique connection to a Jewish film festival. They may be made by Jewish film-makers, contain Jewish themes, or reflect opinions by and about Jews. We also strive to take advantage of our superb Seattle arts community and geography with films by local filmmakers and placed in local venues.

The Seattle Jewish Film Festival is produced by an amazing ensemble led by SJFF Director Molly Sedlik, her dedicated and able staff, and Gregg Lachow, returning this year as Curator. They bring nothing short of inspiration. Committee members, the AJC Board and Executive Director, our generous returning major sponsors - Starbucks, a Vulcan Enterprises, and II Fornaio - along with individual supporters and our audience combine to create what has become an unforgettable Seattle institution.



### FILMTALKS! FORUM

Celebrating its Fifth Anniversary this year, *FILMTalks!* has become the American Jewish Committee's cornerstone educational program for Seattle area youth. Using the popular and engaging art of film to launch students into dialogue on issues of respecting diversity and confronting prejudice, more than 2,200 students, from 23 different public, private, and parochial high schools, have attended this free daylong workshop at the annual Seattle Jewish Film Festival.

### FILMTALKS! ON CAMPUS

This year John Marshall High School and Ingraham High School participated in an expanded program called *FILMTalks!* on *Campus*, based upon the American Jewish Committee's acclaimed national education program, Hands Across the Campus. This innovative program intensifies the dialogue and provides activities designed to improve intergroup relations in these schools. In the '02-'03 school year the AJC will be partnering with five to ten area high schools in the year-round programming of *FILMTalks!* on *Campus*.





### **BINDS THAT TIE**

The struggle between tradition and progress is an eternal one; each of us works for, and at times against, the vital bonds of love, faith, and community. Often, as the protagonists of these films discover, the greater the struggle, the tighter the binds.

Within an increasingly blended society, The American Jewish Committee (AJC) is dedicated to ensuring Jewish continuity and creating Jewish renewal. AJC has undertaken several innovative and ambitious initiatives to build stronger ties among Jewish denominations in America, to strengthen relations and understanding between American Jewry and Israeli Jews, and to advocate for Jewish communal policies that ensure Jewish continuity in the future.

### **HOMELAND INSECURITY**

How successfully do we, as individuals or as nations, increase our own security if in the attempt to do so we threaten the security of others? This year, films from the US, Israel, and Argentina help us explore a subject that has taken on new dimensions since September 11th.

AJC has consistently produced probing and sophisticated analyses of threats facing the United States, Israel, and the Western world, and has been a leading international voice in advocating for the implementation of major policy initiatives to combat terrorism worldwide.

### THE FUTURE OF MEMORY

"The more past there is the less I know of it." Yet Jews are obligated to remember. The crucial decisions of what stories to tell, and how to tell them, are often made within the medium of film, and the forum of a film festival.

AJC addresses the future of memory in two key ways. Research: A significant part of AJC's educational and advocacy work on Holocaust-related issues is devoted to producing research reports aimed at deepening understanding of the Holocaust, and furthering efforts to ensure that with the passage of time, memory and remembrance will endure. Education: AJC's Central and East European Curriculum Review Project focuses on countries that have recently emerged from Communist rule. What do the children of Central and East Europe learn in the classroom about Judaism, Jewish history, the Holocaust, and Israel? By making clear what exists in the educational sphere at present, the Curriculum Review Project seeks to spur curriculum reform where appropriate.





The first film to tell the story of the development of the Israeli nuclear option. Featuring extensive interviews with, among others, Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres, director Michael Karpin's compelling documentary lucidly details the extraordinarily complex, costly, and secretive endeavor that has perhaps guaranteed Israel's survival among nations. The Jerusalem neighborhood of Gilo has been the target of sniper attacks from the adjacent Palestinian village of Beit Jala since the beginning of the latest Intifada. It also presents the Israeli government's reaction—positioning tanks in the streets of their once peaceful neighborhood. As we watch images of mortar attacks on Beit Jala and the continuous firing on Gilo we are made witnesses to the human consequences of the current hostilities.





Their other neighbor, Horst, now an enthusiastic Nazi collaborator, drops by at odd hours and begins to suspect. The collaborator's German boss, shattered by the death of his young sons in the war,

announces that he is moving into the couple's spare room, and to keep him away, Marie blurts out that she is with child and saving the room for a nursery. Trouble is, she is not pregnant but needs to be, and the only candidates are her sterile husband, the Nazi follower and the hidden Jew. Scoundrel, ordinary sinner and hero all rub shoulders-and sometimes overlap-in this comedic and poignant tale of human strength and frailty.
