HAVE WE GOT A FESTIVAL FOR VOU!

Our eighth season finds us in a comfortable role as the largest annual Jewish event in the Northwest. Last year's survey revealed some fascinating facts about you, the nearly 8,000 local community members who attend SJFF. We found that 38% of those sampled had never attended the film festival before. This is amazing! SJFF continues to grow by word of mouth. To us, this means that we have a thriving, active, and interested community. We applied your enthusiasm for SJFF and your ability to sustain the strength of Greater Seattle's arts programs.

We also found that Israeli history and society topped the list of interests for our film-goers. We continue to bring varied visions of Israel to our festival, with the distinct understanding that our individual definitions of 'what it means to be Jewish' are closely tied, especially at a time like this, to the land of Israel. This year's films bring the reality of Israel's birth to light in new ways (Kedma) while also sharing 17 different Israeli director's snapshots of contemporary life (Moments Israel: 2002). Of course, we cannot ignore the struggles that every human being in Israel goes through, and decided to take a pro-active role in discussing films that address everything from terrorism (Israel in a Time of Terror) and the settlements (The Settlers) to inter-faith love affairs (A Trumpet in the Wadi) and the escapist fantasies of every-day Palestinians (Divine Intervention).

Did we say comfortable?

Indeed our "Can We Talk?!" platform has never been a more critical component of our programming. While we feel honored to be able to provide a week full of delightful humor, inspiring ideas, and magical reflections on the past, we also feel obligated to explore sticky situations and learn from each other through dialogue. Using the model of the American Jewish Committee, the oldest human rights organization in the United States, we view the structure of the Festival itself as a powerful forum within which to explore and discuss themes important to our Jewish community.

Equally as important, we found that you attend SJFF because you love film. We remain committed to bringing the best of Jewish film from around the world to the Cinerama for your enjoyment. We find laughter in unsuspected places (Hitler's Hat) and pair that with fresh news about an unsurpassed classic (The Tramp and the Dictator). Our films celebrate Middle Eastern musical heritage (Café Noah and Tagasim), bring us to the Sephardic quarters of a Greek Island (Anna's Summer), and introduce us to the first Jewish state (L'Chavim Comrade Stalin).

Without the support of our corporate sponsors and generous donors this week would not be possible. We ask that you continue to support all of the businesses that support SJFF with the same enthusiasm that you attend this week of film.

However you choose to travel the week with us, on behalf of the American Jewish Committee Seattle Chapter, please know we are thrilled that you have chosen to join each other in the pursuit of art, wisdom and entertainment.

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Dear Friends

The Seattle Chapter of the American Jewish Committee is delighted to present the Eighth Annual Seattle Jewish Film Festival, a gem in our programming year. SJFF has become one of the anticipated events of the Jewish year in Seattle: it's where the entire community comes together to share the richness and diversity of Jewish culture.

Many of the films this year are pertinent to these trying times; some are controversial. SJFF provides a valuable forum for individuals with different viewpoints to come together to grapple with difficult issues. Providing such forums is a key function of the AJC, but, of course, that is not all. This year's film selections include our usual wide variety of comedy, feature films and documentaries. Variety is another hallmark of SJFF.

This year's Film Festival also marks the 6th anniversary of FILMTalks!. On Thursday the 13th, FILMTalks! will bring together 400 Seattle-area high school students for an all-day prejudice reduction workshop. Expanding upon our success, AJC now brings FILMTalks! into the classroom at four local high schools.

Our AJC chapter is thriving. In the past year, AJC and ADL co-sponsored a rally in support of Israel and America's war on terrorism. Steve Pomerantz, former head of the FBI's anti-terrorism unit, spoke to us about current anti-terrorism activities. Dan Levitas spoke about the dangers posed by the white supremacist movement, and we presented a panel discussion about America, Oil, Iraq and War. In October, we recognized Helen Jackson and the Henry M. Jackson Foundation with AJC's Human Relations Award, and in January we co-sponsored a Shabbat evening service honoring Supreme Court Justice C.Z. Smith. And this spring, 20 high school students will receive the Max Block Award for Human Relations, recognizing the human relations efforts of young people.

Our Seattle chapter is part of the national AJC, which does amazing things. Check out its superb web site, www.ajc.org. If you are not yet a member of AJC please consider joining. Membership and tax-deductible contributions are the foundation upon which AJC builds its programs.





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

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SEATTLE JEWISH FILM FESTIVAL 2003 THEMES

WHAT'S SO FUNNY?

Some say that having a G-d you can argue with means having a G-d you can joke with. Others say that Jews throughout history have relied on humor to overcome the pain of persecution. Whatever the cause, the films in this series incorporate and celebrate the ability of humor to keep Jews afloat on today's rough seas and grounded in the joys of Jewish culture.

The mission of the American Jewish Committee includes safeguarding the continuity and ensuring the future quality of Jewish life. In 2000 the AJC, along with the Norman Lear Center, published *Television's Changing Image of American Jews*. This fascinating book takes a look at the continuum of Jewish comedy in America from Jack Benny to Jerry Seinfeld, revealing the profound impact of *shtick* in our everyday lives.

ISRAEL: THIS LAND IS MY LAND

Arguably, Israel is at the center of our world's politics, bolstered and buffeted on all sides. Like no other, it is a land that holds the promise of both unparalleled triumph and devastating heartbreak. This year a number of directors have resolutely and forcibly trained their cameras on issues of sovereignty and human rights, in the process encouraging dialogue and creating some extraordinary films.

As active, long-time supporters of an Arab-Israeli peace process based on direct bilateral negotiations and advanced with American assistance, AJC remains committed to the principle that Israel and its neighbors ultimately should resolve their differences at the bargaining table rather than in the streets or on a battlefield.

THE ALLY WITHIN

"If not me, than who?" Hillel's famous question resonates with obligation but also with opportunity. Right up to and including the present day, Jewish history has been fraught with confrontations with real evil, but also, and more importantly, with examples of true heroism. The protagonists in these films discover that times of crisis offer the opportunity to learn from and act on the best that is within us.

AJC is committed to recognizing community leaders who demonstrate their profound commitment to human rights. In 2002 AJC Seattle honored Helen Jackson for her efforts in the fields of public service, the environment, human rights and international affairs. Every June, the Max H. Block Human Relations Award is bestowed upon local high school seniors honoring their contributions to strengthening inter-group relations and promoting respect for the humanity of others without regard to race, ethnicity or national origin. AJC fosters future heroes and celebrates acts of altruism.



NOWHERE IN AFRICA

Seattle Premiere Germany, 2002, 141 min. German w/subtitles Caroline Link, Director



A love story spanning two continents. Nowhere in Africa is the extraordinary tale of a Jewish family that narrowly escapes the Nazi regime in 1938 for a remote farm in colonial Kenya. Abandoning their once-comfortable existence in Germany, Walter Redlich, his wife Jettel (Juliane Köhler, of Aimee and Jaguar) and their fiveyear-old daughter Regina each deal with the harsh realities of their new life in different ways. Attorney Walter is resigned to working the farm as a caretaker; pampered Jettel resists adjustment at every turn; while the shy yet curious Regina immediately embraces the country - learning the local language and customs, and finding a friend in Owuor, the farm's cook. While the war rages far away, the trio's relationships



Those who saw Farewell at last year's Festival know director Arkadi Yakhnis as a poet with a camera. Here he returns with a tender requiem for loved ones lost, and a wonderous tale of love regained. 70-year-old Isaac survived the terrible war years alone in the basement of his neighbor's house. He now awaits the coming of the Messiah, who will reunite him with all of his perished loved ones. Slowly, people and activity return to his Ukranian village: Wanda, who survived a concentration camp; David, Isaac's son-in-law, who fought in the army in Africa; Helena, Wanda's sister whom David has loved since childhood; and Lapchikha, who hid Isaac during the war. When Isaac meets the gypsy Maria, herself left bereft by the Holocaust, a strange, funny, and tender romance begins.

GOD IS GREAT, I AM NOT

France, 2001, 95 min. French w/subtitles Pascale Bailly, Director



A delightful romantic fable, with a sparkling cast led by Audrey Tautou, of Amelie fame. Tautou plays Michèle, a sweet and slightly crazy Parisian model whose relationship with her boyfriend has gone bust, leaving her emotionally and spiritually adrift. Enter into her life Francois, an easy-going, Jewish veterinarian. Their nascent relationship is soon on firm footing: that is, until Michèle abandons her Buddhist texts and decides to convert to Judaism. As secular as Michèle is spiritually inclined, François can't quite muster the requisite enthusiasm for his girlfriend's energetic embrace of all things Jewish, especially when she insists that he prove his love by being more observant. With a remarkably light touch, first-time feature director Pascale Bailly explores Jewish identity, interfaith coupling, and France's ethnic mix.

When Jewish children were saved from the Nazis during WWII, many times it was non-Jews who hid them inside their homes. For months and sometimes years at a time these children were cut off from the world, at great risk to everyone involved. Academy Award winner Aviva Slesin's intensely personal documentary tells the remarkable stories of some of these children and their rescuers. An inspirational account

of ordinary people behaving extraordinarily, Secret Lives reveals courage and strength of character under the worst conditions in the history of human conflict. Slesin, herself one of these hidden children, writes, "For a long time I thought of this as the work of my dreams. Then I started to understand that it was also the work of my nightmares."

DIVINE INTERVENTION

France, Morocco, Germany, Palestinian Territories, 2002 100min. Arabic/Hebrew w/subtitles Elia Suleiman, Director



Elia Suleiman is perhaps the most important filmmaker in the Arab world today, making him an artist whom Israeli Jews, and the world at large, must grapple with. Divine Intervention, winner of the Grand Jury Prize at Cannes, has already provoked impassioned discussion around the world. Now it is our turn. As Leslie Camhi writes in The NY Times, the film is "a series of elegant, barbed gags, distilling the frustration, rage and hopelessness of contemporary Palestinian existence into a wry burlesque. 





In the late 1930's German Jews were trying to escape Nazi persecution, but country after country closed its doors to them. Then, suddenly, a beacon of hope appeared a continent and a world away-in, of all places, Japanesecontrolled Shanghai, to which one could book passage from an Italian port without needing a visa. Jewish refugees journeyed to the exotic city, arriving penny-less and unprepared for life in the Far East. Befriended by local Jewish and Chinese residents and aided by American Jewish organizations, the refugees struggled to construct a cohesive community in a squalid, impoverished part of town. For many comparatively upscale refugees, this was their first contact with the heart-rending

poverty and exemplary kindness of the Chinese people. The film was shot in modern Shanghai, where most of the Jewish ghetto remains unchanged. A riveting, uplifting, and unforgettable film.

Charlie Chaplin and Adolf Hitler were born within a week of each other in April 1889. The Nazis mistakenly believed Chaplin to be Jewish. In a 1934 anti-Semitic propaganda leaflet Chaplin is described as a "disgusting Jewish acrobat." Chaplin knew about the pamphlet and it is believed that it prompted him to make The Great Dictator, a very daring film that laughed in the face of the totalitarian regimes and the hardship they inflicted. This documentary features black-andwhite archive footage of Hitler's rallies and excerpts from The Great Dictator, interspersed with interviews with film critics. historians, and a contemporary of Hitler. However, the most
